What is it like to be a citizen of the Kingdom of God? What is likely to happen on a given day? How are citizens expected to behave? How is the Kingdom of God different from other realms on our planet—past or present? And where do we find this kingdom in the context of our present world of complex and competing kingdoms?

I suggest you read Doug Rowston's new book, *Things that Jesus said*. Rowston analyses the parables of Jesus in the first three Gospels focusing on the key kingdom symbol of each parable, the background of that symbol and how that symbol may be relevant even today. For example, the parable of the labourers in the vineyard is about 'the grace of God's kingdom' and 'reveals the good news of Jesus in a nutshell'. Other parables will reveal that forgiveness is a way of life in the kingdom or that the kingdom is something really valuable, a hidden treasure to be discovered.

In Part B of his book, Rowston explores parables in John's Gospel which he describes as parables of eternal life. Many scholars have not identified these passages as parables, but Rowston demonstrates the connection with the parables in the first three gospels. In sum: The Gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke tell Jesus' parables about God's kingdom. John's Gospel tells parables of Jesus, 'who is the king of God's kingdom and brings God's kind of life' (p. 94).

For example, The Parable of the Night Breeze is embodied in the 'wind blowing where it chooses' (John 3.8) and describes the coming of the life of God's new age. Rowston interprets the image of a woman in labour and in childbirth (John 16.21) as a parable relating to the crisis of the life of God's new age. The interpretation of these passages from John—and eleven more —as embodying parables is a rich, original and refreshing reading of the colourful imagery in the words of Jesus in John.

Rowston's readings of the explicit and implicit parables of the Gospel is a profound and readable analysis, appropriate for both meditation and serious group study.

INTRODUCTION

Things that Jesus said is written against the background of a lifetime's interest in the stories of Jesus. At Sunday School and in church services I learnt what Jesus did and said according to the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. I could identify with the words of Paul, When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child (1 Corinthians 13:11a). I basically heard and read the Gospels without analysing the content. At theological college and then in doctoral studies, things changed, as I asked questions and found answers by utilising the tools of biblical research. In other words, in the words of Paul, when I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways (1 Corinthians 13:11b). All of this was the usual stage of human development which goes from concrete to abstract thinking.

Now while I read the stories of Jesus with grandchildren, I realise that they are in the stage of thinking concretely of the content of these stories. In time they will move to the process of thinking abstractly about the meaning of the stories. Obviously, this book about the parables of Jesus is not written for children. If one requires Bible stories written for young children, I recommend the likes of The Lost Sheep Series written by my friend Andrew McDonough. My grandchildren love his version of the parable of the good Samaritan! However, in this book for adults, we ask questions and find answers about parables of Jesus.

The parables of Jesus include figurative sayings, similitudes, and story-parables. *Things that Jesus said* treats parables of Jesus in all four Gospels. Usually, most scholars think of

parables restricted to the first three Gospels, the Synoptic Gospels. The first half of this book examines Synoptic parables about the coming and growth, grace and mercy, citizens and crisis of the kingdom of God. Unusually, a few scholars identify parables in the Fourth Gospel. This book is in the unusual category. In the second half there is an analysis of Johannine parables about the coming, enduring love, sharers and crisis of the life of the age that comes in Jesus.

Things that Jesus said is indebted to my experience as a theological lecturer at Burleigh College, a religious education teacher at Prince Alfred College, a pastor at Richmond Baptist Church, and an adjunct lecturer at St Barnabas College (Charles Sturt University). I have found inspiration for my approach from, among others, C.H. Dodd, Joachim Jeremias, A.M. Hunter, Peter Rhea Jones, Arland Hultgren, William Hull, Alan Culpepper, and Ben Witherington. I thank my wife Rosalie for her patience and love during the writing of this book. I am also extremely grateful to my brother Laurie for his meticulous checking of the completed draft of this work. I trust that my readers come to appreciate the Synoptic and Johannine parables as provocative, dynamic and creative.
